I. General information on study programmes

1. Faculty of Arts, Charles University in Prague (CUFA) organizes doctoral study programmes **either in** a **full-time form or in a combined form** for accredited study subjects. The course of study adheres to **an individual plan of study**, in accordance with **Provision of the Dean No. 20/2010** as amended. The programme is completed after passing Ph.D. state finals and a dissertation defence. The graduate is awarded a "Ph.D." degree.

More detailed information on the doctoral study programmes at CUFA, study regulations and plans of study are available at www.ff.cuni.cz, English version, under Degree Programmes, or under Organisation/Faculty Administration/Research Department and at the websites of the respective departments and institutes of the Faculty.

II. General information on admission procedure

1. The admission procedure is regulated by Articles 48-50 of Act No. 111/98 Coll. – the Higher Education Act of the Czech Republic, by Appendix No. 5 of the Charles University Constitution – Admission Procedure Regulations, and by this *Admission Procedure Specification for academic year* 2014/2015.

- 2. Invitations to entrance examinations are dispatched to applicants who have applied in the proper way, 28 days at the latest before the date of the examination.
- 3. **Decisions** on non/admittance will be announced at the faculty website http://is.cuni.cz/studium (English version, under "Admission procedure status" after filling in personal data), after the central admissions committee has convened). Decisions on non/admittance can only be dispatched to applicants who have submitted a copy of an MA degree diploma certified by a notary public, or a confirmation proving study completion (see Section III, 2.1.1 and 2.1.2 herein).
- 4. The fee for study programmes conducted in a foreign language will be charged in accordance with the Provision of the Dean for the Academic Year 2014/15.

III. Application for study

1. The application form is to be submitted on-line using a form which will be available, together with further details, at the Faculty's website in January 2014. In the official application form called "Study application form for the academic year..." the following items of information must be completed: form of study (full-time, combined) and degree programme.

The application form has to be filled in online. After it has been filled in, the application must be printed out and signed, and sent by post or submitted in person to the address of the Faculty by 30 April 2014. Subsequently, the application status can be tracked at http://is.cuni.cz/studium at the "Admission procedure status" section, which provides details on its status, filing, entrance examination dates and results of the admission procedure.

2. Along with the application form the following enclosures must be submitted:

2.1. Proof of Educational Attainment:

- 2.1.1 Applicants who have completed their MA study prior to the application deadline should submit a copy of their MA degree diploma certified by a notary public. Applicants who will not have completed their MA study prior to the application deadline should submit a certificate of completion of studies to the Research Department of the Faculty by 30 September 2014. Applicants who submit a certificate of completion of studies will still be required to provide a certified copy of their MA degree diploma immediately after it has been issued.
- 2.1.2 Applicants with MA degrees from universities outside the Czech Republic (with the exception of the Slovak Republic) must submit a certificate of recognition of higher education completed at a foreign institution in accordance with Paras. 89 and 90 of Statute No. 111/1998 (Higher Education) to the Research Department, also by 30 September 2014.

- 2.3 PhD dissertation project (3-5 pages)
- 2.4 Reading list of works relevant to the field of study
- 2.5 Outline of previous academic career (publications, research, employment, etc.)
- 2.6 Original receipt for payment of the administrative fee (bank transfer or online payment receipt, or receipt from the Faculty's Finance Office for payments in cash). The fee will not be returned at any stage of the admission procedure. The fee must be paid for each application submitted.

Applicants are recommended to apply for diploma recognition simultaneously with the application submission, as the recognition process requires a long time.

- 3. Applicants may use one PhD dissertation project with an application for only one study programme. In case more applications are submitted to which the identical PhD dissertation project is attached, the Faculty will request the applicant to specify which application that project belongs to, as well as to add different projects to the other applications. If the applicant fails to comply, the application will not be considered.
- 4. If the application form is not filled in correctly or does not contain all the required information and enclosures, the Faculty will request the applicant to supply the missing items by a reasonable deadline set by the Faculty. If the applicant fails to submit the required items, the application will not be considered.

IV. Entrance examination

- 1. The entrance examination is carried out in a **single round and in an oral form**. It examines subject-related knowledge and aptitude for independent research activity in the chosen field. The examination includes discussion on the dissertation project. In philological study programmes, the entrance examination committee may require that part of the interview be conducted in the respective language.
- 2. It is advisable that the requirements for the entrance examination and the dissertation topic be consulted in advance with the head of the subject-area board of the respective subject. The dissertation project must be submitted even for those study programmes that have published suggested dissertation topics.
- 3. The Dean may permit an alternative date for entrance examinations only if the applicant applies in writing and this application is submitted to the Admissions Department no later than on **the third day** after the regular date of examination, in cases where the applicant was unable to take the examination on a regular date for serious and justified reasons (health problems, final state examinations, study abroad, etc.). The request for an alternative date should not be included with the application form, and should be submitted to the Admissions Department only after the applicant has received an invitation stating the regular date of the entrance examination.
- 4. The Dean may permit an examination in the form of a video conference only if the applicant applies in writing and this application is received by the Admissions Department no later than **ten days** before the regular date of examination, in cases where the applicant is unable to take the examination on either the regular date or the alternative date for serious and justified reasons (study abroad, academic exchange or assistantship abroad, etc.). Illness or participation in entrance examinations for other institutions will not be considered as reasons for conducting the entrance examination in the form of a video conference. The dean's permission is conditioned by a consent of the chairman of the departmental subject area board.
- 5. Admittance can only be approved for applicants who have submitted their applications with all the required enclosures (as specified in III. 2.1. above), have completed their Master's degree, and passed the entrance examination. In order to pass, applicants must score 30 or more points, and rank within a pre-determined maximum number of candidates to be admitted to each particular course of study (see Ch. IV, Conditions of Admission), whereby any applicant who achieves the same total score as the applicant ranked lowest in the group to be admitted will also be admitted. The total score consists of the assessment in the individual parts of the examination, i.e. discussion on the dissertation project (0-30 points); assessment of the applicant's previous professional activities (0-15 points); knowledge of subject-related literature (0-15 points).

The Ph.D. Programme Board does not offer specific topics for Ph.D. candidates. Candidates can choose their topics freely. However, they should be aware of the primary fields of interests of the members of the Department of Logic, i.e. nonclassical logics, set theory, metamathematics, and interactions between these fields, including the historical aspects. Each Ph.D. student should have a qualified supervisor committed to close cooperation with the student. The supervisor—a member of the Ph.D. <u>Programme Board</u> or a researcher whom the Board finds eligible—must be known already at the entrance exam. Topics outside the fields of interests of the members of the department should first be discussed with the chairman of the Board.

MUSICOLOGY

Doctoral study program of musicology is open to master graduates in the field of musicology from foreign universities.

Candidates are required to make the members of the examining body acquainted with their prior professional career, subject(s) of previous study, practical field experience and publishing activities to date, if applicable. Candidates are obliged to submit a written proposal of their future dissertation project. The proposal will serve as the basis for an academic discussion aimed at examining both the candidates' familiarity with the essential theoretical foundations of the discipline and their knowledge of topics related to the proposed dissertation project. Candidates should demonstrate elementary passive knowledge of the Czech language. In order to read academic literature and to study sources written in Czech they will be encouraged to improve their Czech language proficiency in the course of their studies.
